

How to Cite Your Sources for a **Research** Project

Whenever you do research or Inquiry project, you will borrow information from many different types of sources (books, encyclopedias, databases, interviews, the Internet...). You must give credit to the author of the resource you have used. This is called a **citation**. All citations make up a **bibliography**.

Always look for the following information:

- Author's name
- Titles- Book, Magazine or Newspaper, Encyclopedia Article, Web page title
- Dates-Copyright date, date published
- Web address
